Make sure to wear comfortable shoes and get your curious eyes ready: whether you are just visiting or you live in Bergamo, I promise you will feel as if you are seeing Bergamo for the first time!

Now.. here is a bit of trivia. Who is Margi? In the history and tradition of Bergamo, there are only a few female names. I chose Margi because it is the name of a famous card game in Bergamo, which I used to play as a child with my grandmother after I had finished my homework. PS. She always cheated!



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My name is Rachele, and I am a university student and a traveller! My personal motto is "act like a local". I am always in search of the most hidden corners and places frequented by locals when I travel.

I love sleeping in hostels, travelling with just a backpack on my shoulders, meeting people, exploring new places and cultures which are different from my own.

This passion of mine is the reason behind Fernweh, my travel blog in which I talk about my trips, recommend out-of-the-way places and alternative routes. Fernweh is a German word coined in the 19th century by Prince Pückler: a great lover of travel, Pückler claimed that he never suffered from "Heimweh", or homesickness, but rather from "Fernweh", or nostalgia for the elsewhere. This word describes me to a tee. I am always homesick for the elsewhere, for what is far away and different from me! That is why I always have a trip booked!

Aeroporto Bergamo's Airport



Did you know that Bergamo's Orio al Serio International Airport (Il Caravaggio) is the third busiest airport in Italy in terms of number of passengers?! If you fly to Bergamo and land at this airport, your last problem will be the distance to the city centre, as it is only 5 km away.

HOW DO I GET TO DOWNTOWN BERGAMO FROM THE AIRPORT?

The airport is well connected to the city centre thanks to the Airport Shuttle, which runs every 20 minutes every day of the week. This shuttle takes you to Bergamo's train/bus station, a stone's throw from the city centre, and allows you to reach Città Alta (the Upper City) either directly or with quick changes to Line 1 and the Funicular. The ticket costs €2.40 (fare C) if you buy it from the authorised ticket offices or €3.00 directly on the bus (though I recommend that you buy your ticket before boarding the bus, just to be sure).

HOW EARLY DO YOU HAVE TO GET TO THE AIRPORT?

The airport has only one terminal and is quite small, so you can reach the gates quickly, but there are often long queues at the check-in desks. So I advise you to always arrive early enough! And if you happen to get there very early, you can always stop off at the Orio Center shopping centre and do a bit of shopping. It is just a 10-minute walk to the airport. Cosa vedere What to see



How does one figure out what the must-see places are in a city that one is not familiar with? Don't worry, we are here to help you!

CITTÀ ALTA

The historical city on the hill, in medieval style: let yourself be enthralled by the towers, the narrow streets and the panoramic terraces!

BERGAMO BASSA

The city centre, more modern and full of life! Visit it and allow yourself to be captivated by the stunning buildings, squares and parks of this part of the city!

VAL D'ASTINO

A valley at the foot of Città Alta, with a magnificent botanical garden and a monastery surrounded by vineyards.

BORCHI MEDIEVALI

here are five of them and they were built along the roads that connected the hill on which Bergamo stands to the most important city centres nearby. Among the most fascinating ones, we recommend Borgo Pignolo, Borgo Santa Caterina and Borgo S. Alessandro.

Esperienze Experiences



Living like a local and experiencing like a local when visiting any city is crucial if you want to be a real traveller! Here are a few tips to help you make the most of your stay in Bergamo:

EAT IN THE COMPANY OF OTHERS AT A LOCAL FAIR

It is hard to recommend one in particular because there are so many wonderful ones! They change from season to season, so as to take advantage of the freshness of seasonal products. But you should know that a true Bergamask will never miss the polenta taragna fair, the porchetta fair or the mushroom fair!

ENJOY A SHOW

In the enchanting Teatro Donizetti or at the Teatro Sociale in Città Alta: [click here](#) or the program. If, on the other hand, you are a film lover, live an unforgettable experience at the [Cinema Capitol](#), where you will feel as if you were taking a dip in the magnificent 90s.

TRY THE STRACCIATELLA ICE CREAM

in the place where it was invented: you might not know this, but the straciatella flavour was originally invented by the famous ice cream shop La Marianna in Bergamo in the 1960s: try it in Città Alta at its historic restaurant!

Bagagli Your luggage



You will probably have to check-in too late or check-out too early at the hotel you have chosen and would like to be able to explore beautiful Bergamo without having to carry your luggage around with you! If this is the case, then we suggest you take advantage of a service called [Radical Storage](#): for only €5, you can leave your luggage for the entire day at a bar, hotel or restaurant in the city (yes, there are no time limits!). Or if you want to do things in a more traditional way, we recommend the three most strategic luggage storage facilities in the city.

BERGAMO BASSA

Near the train/bus station, next to the Urban Center, there is a 24-hour luggage storage facility, which is fully automated. Prices are as follows: €4 per day for a large piece of luggage and €3 for a small one.

CITTÀ ALTA

Inside the Torre di Adalberto in Città Alta (Winter hours: 9:30 am - 5:00 pm - Summer hours: 8:30 am - 7:00 pm).

AEROPORTO ORIO AL SERIO

It is located near the car park cash desk at the entrance to the terminal. You can drop off your luggage from 8:00 am until 7:00 pm and pick it up between 8.00 am and midnight.

Dormire Where to sleep



One of the most difficult choices to make when planning a trip is where to sleep - but don't worry, we can help you choose what is best for you! Here are the most strategic areas of the city:

CITTÀ ALTA

How charming it is to sleep in a medieval village, especially if it is well connected to the Bergamo Bassa by means of the Funicular and buses. We recommend you choose this area if you have a slightly higher budget but, more importantly, if you want to enjoy a unique experience!

DOWNTOWN BERGAMO BASSA

A much more dynamic area, suitable for those who want to discover the more modern side of the city. Well connected to the entire city and province, it is just a short walk from the train/bus station.


BORGO SANTA CATERINA

A short distance from the city centre, it is ideal for those looking for less touristy, but more authentic and down-to-earth areas. The neighbourhood is lovely, full of small shops and restaurants. You will be staying in a special place where the residents still feel part of a vibrant community. Well connected to the city centre, you can easily reach Città Alta by walking up the Noca staircase. Moreover, it is in a strategic position to reach two beautiful mountain valleys: Valle Seriana and Valle Brembana.

PARCO DEI COLLI

The most charming place to stay, surrounded by nature, with breath-taking views of the entire plains and of the mountains around you. Here you can find great B&Bs and holiday farmhouses, although I recommend this area only if you have the use of a car since it is not well served by public transportation

Funicolare The funicular



What could be a more typical way of reaching Città Alta and exploring the surrounding hills than the historic funiculars? There are two in Bergamo, which can be taken using the city bus ticket!

THE FUNICULAR OF CITTÀ ALTA: It connects Bergamo Bassa with Città Alta, departing from Viale Vittorio Emanuele II and going all the way up to Piazza Mercato delle Scarpe, just a few steps from the historic centre.

S. VIGILIO FUNICULAR: Linking Città Alta with the Colle di San Vigilio, this funicular takes you to an even higher point of the city. The station is located in Largo Porta Sant'Alessandro and takes you within walking distance of the Castle of San Vigilio.

[Bergamo Wi-Fi](#) will be your constant companion during your stay, providing free Internet access.

You will find various public hotspots located throughout the city. Connecting to the service is very easy. Just send a text message to the number +39 3424035035 writing "Ciao" or "Hello": the system will quickly reply and send you the credentials you need to access the network (username and password).

Like a local "Come un Bergamasco"

Now, we are going to share with you a bit of trivia that only true Bergamasks know, so that, as you stroll through the streets of Bergamo you will be able to feel just like one of us:

COLLEONI'S TESTICLES: the beauty of the Colleoni Chapel in Piazza Duomo is undisputable, but if you approach the gate you will discover a most unusual detail: the Colleoni coat of arms with Colleoni's famous "three testicles"! If you were with your grandmother and she was a native of Bergamo, she would tell you to touch them because they were thought to bring good luck! So when visiting Bergamo, you absolutely have to do this! You will recognise them for the wear and tear caused by all the Bergamasks who have touched them hoping for a bit of good luck!

LA FARA: Bergamo is also known as the "green city" for its large green areas and parks. If you come to Bergamo during the spring or summer seasons, you should definitely make a relaxing stop at the Fara, where you will find many young people lounging among the wonders of Città Alta.

SUNDAY LUNCH: if you are in Bergamo on a Sunday, you cannot miss a typical lunch like the locals enjoy, so go to a trattoria and taste the traditional polenta!

"DOING LAPS": on Saturday afternoons or during lunch breaks, you will usually see Bergamasks strolling back and forth along Via XX Settembre, the main street of Bergamo Bassa, which is lined with shops and wonderful cafes! So what can we say? Come to Bergamo and do some laps on Via XX Settembre!

Ho fame I'm hungry



We can only imagine how hungry you will be after your long walks around the city! Bergamo has so many typical dishes... you'll see how good they smell at lunchtime on Sunday along the city streets! We recommend many places suited to all kinds of tastes! You'll be spoiled for choice!

Musei Museum



Bergamo offers plenty of museums for all interests and ages! Here is a list of just a few of them:

ACCADEMIA CARRARA: this is wonder made museum! Here you can find mainly pictorial works of art from the beginning of the 15th century up to the 19th century. Among the outstanding artists are Andrea Mantegna, Giovanni Bellini, Raphael, the Baschenis, Lorenzo Lotto, Titian and many others.

GAMEC: Bergamo's Galleria d'Arte Moderna e Contemporanea (Modern and Contemporary Art Gallery), which hosts unique temporary exhibitions, so visit the website and find out what amazing exhibitions are scheduled during your stay in Bergamo.

MUSEO CIVICO DI SCIENZE NATURALI "Enrico Caffi": ("Enrico Caffi Museum of Natural Sciences"): if nature is your great passion or if you are travelling with children, a stop at the Museum of Natural Sciences is a must! Here you will find the famous Mammoths and a deer over 700,000 years old!

MUSEO DELLE STORIE DI BERGAMO: (Museum of the histories of Bergamo): six locations to discover the history of Bergamo and its most important buildings: the Torre dei Caduti, the Rocca, the interactive museum of the 16th century with the Torre del Campanone, the Convent of S. Francesco and the Museo Donizettiano. Discover them all with a special card that can be purchased online or at the ticket office!

CASA NATALE DI DONIZETTI (Donizetti's natal home): the humble birthplace of the composer from Bergamo features a small but charming museum of his life! The windows overlooking Bergamo Bassa are worth the entrance fee alone!

ARCHAEOLOGICAL MUSEUM: if ancient history is your greatest passion, you cannot miss this jewel of archaeology! A journey among domus, statues, coins and findings to reconstruct the history of Bergamo!

TREASURE MUSEUM OF THE CATHEDRAL: a journey into the undergrounds of Piazza Vecchia, to discover Roman remains, Lombard tombs and, above all, the first Christian church in Bergamo, right in the heart of the city!

Nightlife

"Vita notturna"



How does the city of Bergamo come alive when the sun goes down? Well, don't expect parties and the like as in Barcelona!

Bergamo is a rather quiet town, but we are sure you will be thrilled by its sights lit up by thousands of lights at night! It is a delight both to admire Bergamo Bassa from the battlements of the Venetian Walls and to gaze up at Città Alta from below.

In the first case, take a walk along the Walls: from any vantage point, the view will be breath-taking! In the second case, we advise you to walk in Piazza della Repubblica, and let yourself be charmed by the star of this landscape: Porta San Giacomo! (TIP! The best panoramic view? Obviously from the Roof Garden, where you can dine on one of Bergamo's most stylish terraces).

Living Bergamo as a Bergamask also means having a glass of wine or a beer in one of the liveliest areas of the city! Here are the most popular places and streets:

VIA XX SETTEMBRE: certainly very lively at aperitif time with various bars in Piazza Pontida. This area is also perfect for an after-dinner drink with friends, as the sun goes down but the lights in the bars stay on.

VIA PIGNOLO: especially Pignolo Bassa and Via Tasso offer plenty of open-air bars during aperitif time where you can meet lots of people, especially at weekends.

BORGH SANTA CATERINA: this part of Bergamo becomes even more charming in summer because the entire street becomes car-free and restaurants and bars set up their tables in the middle of the street!

PUBS: The best pubs are located outside the city, but you can also find a good choice in Città Alta Upper with the famous Tucans and the Ca del Fasà. In Bergamo Bassa, we recommend The Ritual Pub and the Sant'Orsola pub.

COCKTAIL BARS: Here the list could be endless, but we will make it simple and choose three of my favourites: Artisan Cafè, Location 58 and Barrier.

SUMMER VENUES: During the summer, Bergamo fills up with the so-called "summer venues", i.e. parks, terraces and gardens that turn into open-air spots offering excellent food and good company! Among the most popular: Goisis, Edonè (also open in winter), Fabric, Spazio Polaresco, Parco della Trucca, Monastero di Astino. The Sant'Agostino park is certainly one of the most characteristic summer venues, hosting several chiringuitos from the city's best restaurants and bars.

Dialect



What dialect is spoken in Bergamo?

The well-known Bergamasque, of course! Here are a few words to make you feel like a real Bergamask (and yes, translate some incomprehensible expressions here and there!):

POTA: perhaps the most famous, most popular and most versatile word, a bit like the colour black "it goes well with everything"! If you are sad, angry or happy the "pòta" in the sentence will always fit!

ALURA: the greeting between friends and acquaintances to make sure everything is going well.

MOCHELA: "stop it".

DEL BU?: has someone told you an anecdote or something that sounds very strange? Answer with these two words to express your amazement, as they literally mean "really?".

FO' DE CO': "out of your mind" or "crazy".

Opening Hours



As good Northerners, Bergamasks may seem somewhat introverted, cold and always too busy with their work. But dig deeper, try to get to know them better and you will find that they are actually very friendly and outgoing!

Here is a typical day in the life of the Bergamasks!

One thing they do not like in particular is to waste time, so they wake up early and start working and being productive right away. Nevertheless, breakfast is served until late, but since the croissants at the bar are very popular, if you get there too late you might not be able to find any!

The ideal time for lunch is certainly from 12:30 to 2:00 pm, but if you are lucky you might find some kitchens that close later.

Bergamasks like to stop after work to have an aperitif before dinner: the perfect time is from 6 pm to 8.30 pm, while restaurant kitchens usually close between 10 pm and 11 pm.

Shops are also open at weekends in downtown Bergamo Bassa and in Città Alta! Some of the smaller shops often choose to close on Mondays: you will find bakeries and grocery stores usually closed on Monday afternoons.

How far is it?



The twofold city of Bergamo is wonderful, but you cannot imagine how many beautiful locations can be found throughout the entire province! Here are some suggestions for places you simply cannot miss, along with their relative distances from Bergamo, so that you can organise a fabulous trip out of town!

SAN PELLEGRINO TERME: in full Art Nouveau style, it will amaze you with the Grand Hotel, the Casino and the relaxing QC Terme. **24 km**

CRESPI D'ADDA: a late 19th century workers' village that has been declared a UNESCO site. **15 km**

SARNICO: a beautiful town between Lake Iseo and Val Calepio. **27 km**

ALMENNO SAN BARTOLOMEO E SAN SALVATORE: a journey into the Romanesque Middle Ages. **14 km**

LAGO DI ENDINE: a lakeside that features a beautiful and relaxing walk. **33 km**

LOVERE: a jewel on Lake Iseo, one of the most beautiful towns in Italy. **42 km**

CLUSONE: a frescoed town, Orange Flag, nestled between the mountains of the Seriana Valley. **34 km**

Regali Gifts



What can you buy to take home a little piece of Bergamo and cherish this city in your heart forever? We would like to recommend some items or products so that you can buy yourself a present that is not the usual boring souvenir, but an object with a history, a value, a beauty or a very characteristic tastiness! There are certainly many shops in Città Alta that offer pretty souvenirs to take home with you! We suggest you drop by [Bibi Cool](#), [Cooperativa Libreria](#), [Il Quartiere](#) and [Libreria Punto a Capo](#), to buy a notebook, a book, a t-shirt... with images, prints and the Bergamo skyline!

Or, why not take home, or to the table, a local food product from Bergamo? It is certainly a good idea and always appreciated by everyone: we are talking about the traditional yellow flour used to make polenta! Now Sunday lunches will have a whole new flavour! We also highly recommend the cake "Polenta e osei", which you can find in all bakeries and pastry shops, the typical cheeses like Branzi and Taleggio, the wine Moscato di Scanzo or the biscuits from the Bigio pastry shop in San Pellegrino Terme.

Trasporti Transportation



How can you get around Bergamo using public transport?

LA BIGI: an alternative way to the classic bike rental. Through the app you can pick up and leave your bike where and when you want.

BIT e REBY ELECTRIC KICK SCOOTERS: pick up and leave your kick scooter wherever and whenever you want.

ATB: The city's transport company. You can use ATB transportation to get to Città Alta either by means of the funicular (see F for funicular) or by bus using Line 1A Città Alta.

How to get around the Bergamo province?

SAB: Val Brembana bus.

TRAM DELLE VALLI: the streetcar that connects the main towns of the Seriana Valley, departing from Bergamo's train/bus station and arriving in the town of Albino.

TRAIN: To move around the province or to reach nearby cities, Bergamo's train/bus station is very convenient and easy to reach! Find all the info on the Trenitalia website!

Where can you buy the tickets?

At authorized retailers such as tobacconists or directly on some buses. Near the station you will also find the Urban Center: info point where to find information and buy train or bus tickets for the entire province of Bergamo.

Verde



Nature parks and green areas

Bergamo is a truly green city, as it is surrounded by hills and the Pre-Alps! But even in the city, nature plays a leading role. Below is a list of some of the parks, gardens and wooded areas where you can spend your free time, taking in some clean air!

In the city:

BERGAMO BASSA: Parco Marenzi, Parco Caprotti, Parco Suardi.

HINTERLAND AND NEARBY TOWNS: Parco dei Colli (the area surrounding Città Alta and the nearby hills is a protected area, which means that you will find bicycle paths and woodland trails to enjoy on a beautiful sunny day!), Parco della Trucca.

CITTÀ ALTA: Botanical Garden L. Rota, Parco delle Rimembranze at the Rocca, battlements of the medieval walls that surround Bergamo Alta, Parco de la Crotta.


Outside the city:

Staircases



Go up to Città Alta by using the staircases: it will be an easy and often quicker way to reach the top of the hill, while enjoying a spectacular view! Of the many staircases, we recommend the following ones.

VIA DELLA NOCA: these stairs will take you from the Accademia Carrara to Porta Sant'Agostino.

VIA SALITA DELLA SCALETTA: it connects Viale Vittorio Emanuele II (where the Bergamo Bassa funicular is located) to Porta San Giacomo.

VIA SANTA LUCIA VECCHIA: these stairs will take you from the intersection of Via A. Rosmini and Via A. Riva Villasanta to Largo Porta San Giacomo.

SCALETTE DELLO SCORLAZZONE E DELLO SCORLAZZINO: used in ancient times by peasants to reach their fields, they take you from Via San Martino della Pigrizia to the picturesque castle of San Vigilio.

Get your backpack ready

Bergamo's climate is diverse, but never extreme: winter in the city is cold, but never bitterly cold. It is quite different if you decide to spend a few days in the mountains!

The summer is rather hot, but you will always have a hill, a panoramic spot, a bench where you can cool down and feel the refreshing air coming down from the valleys!

So what should you put in your backpack when you come?

Simple: as for all the cities of Northern Italy, clothes and outfits for every occasion, but above all a great desire to discover this beautiful city with a twofold soul! Get ready for the WOW effect! You will return home with heart-shaped eyes!
